

Warden's Report

1983 was indeed a year of crisis, challenge and change for St. John's. As Canon Maurice Poole prepared to retire from his ministry with us, we all were concerned about the future of our church. Some of us viewed the situation as a crisis, others felt there was a challenge to maintain ourselves and we all knew that change was undoubtedly upon us.

Your Wardens feel very positively that we have weathered the year of crisis and change and that St. John's will be prepared to meet continuing challenges in the same on-going spirit that has carried us through to the present.

We thank you again for making possible the fine reception in June honouring Maurice and Barbara Poole. It was indeed a fitting tribute to their eighteen years of service to St. John's. A very large number of present and former parishioners, as well as family and friends of the Poole's, attended. Various presentations were made to them, including some small remembrances, a purse of money and a unique ceramic model of our church building complete with carillon music and pigeons.

During the summer months Reverend John Kerr was in charge of our services and we are grateful to him for helping us to prepare for the challenge of change.

We welcomed Reverend Gordon King as Priest-in-Charge in September, and with him, Reverend Robert Kennedy as assistant. Gord and his wife Daisy have quickly become an integral part of St. John's life and we hope we've made them feel at home. Bob Kennedy is known best to those of us who attend the 8:30 a.m. Sunday Service. The majority of his time is engaged in his work with St. Mary the Virgin and St. Cyprian's Church, with Gordon King as his assistant and advisor. We are happy to also welcome Bob Kennedy to St. John's.

An impressive formal Service of Introduction for Gordon King and Robert Kennedy was held in early November with Bishop Geoffrey Parke-Taylor officiating.

We wish to thank the A.C.W. for an outstanding contribution representing individual giving and group money-raising events. How could we manage without them?

Our thanks must also be extended to our Treasurer, Irene Munroe who is always ready to assist in so many ways.

We also wish to thank all of you, our parishioners, who responded so well during the year, both financially (which is so important) and also with your loyalty to St. John's during this year of transition.

Certain maintenance problems have arisen during the year, the most major being the recurrence of water leakage in the area of certain walls of the Parish Hall. We have endeavoured to take all necessary

steps to correct this and prevent any further damage. Also, we hope that we have, at long last, succeeded in discouraging our pigeon population. Their access to the tower is prevented by new screening and roof-edge wires prevent their roosting, particularly over the doorway areas. Special thanks go to Herald Buckle for his many hours of work in "de-pigeoning" the tower.

As you may know, Gordon and Daisy King reside in Scarborough and thus the Rectory became available and was rented at a rental sufficient to assist us in paying our required portion of their housing costs.

A review of the budget for 1984 indicates a projected deficit of approximately \$23,000.00. Our Finance Committee has estimated expenses, and perhaps conservatively, estimated projected income for 1984. In 1983, through additional unanticipated givings we exceeded our income expectations and at the same time we did not require funds to the extent estimated in the 1983 budget, with the result that the year-end net result was far better than the \$28,000.00 deficit predicted. May we urge you to continue your support so that our financial position for 1984 will also be very positive.

From a point of uncertainty in the early part of the year we now feel more secure about our future as we make our way forward to new ministries and new horizons. The crisis and challenge are being met, the change is underway.

THE ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FIRST SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF TORONTO

For a real thrill as an Anglican, try attending the service for the opening of Synod in the Diocese of Toronto. Surrounded by the beauty of our Cathedral Church of St. James, one experiences with the corporate body assembled a great spiritual uplift.

On Thursday, September 22, 1983, at 8:00 p. m., the Cathedral was practically filled. It was inspiring to see a concourse of enrobed clergy occupy the pews of the centre sections. Later came the choir and the group of bishops in their colourful vestments.

A highlight of the service was the Archbishop's Charge to Synod. Despite his recent serious illness, his Grace, seated in his chair placed at the top of the chancel steps, spoke in a remarkably clear voice. On behalf of Mrs. Garnsworthy and himself, he expressed warm thanks for the support they received by a wave of prayer and affection that quite overwhelmed them. Following the Charge, the congregation accorded his Grace a standing ovation, and burst forth in spontaneous applause.

The service of Holy Communion, the Third Canadian Order, was one of palpable warmth and thanksgiving as evidenced in the hearty singing, the generous offering, and in the passing of the peace.

Concluding the worship, the organ pealed in a triumphant paean of praise. The great congregation recessed with the rousing words of his Grace still ringing, "Where there is no vision, the people perish."

On Friday morning the business sessions began. Preeminent was the celebration of achievement when the Venerable
R. K. McKean, Diocesan Director of Anglicans in Mission, gave
his report. At the time of Synod, \$55,000,000 had been pledged
in the National Programme, with \$10,000,000 already paid in.
In the Diocese an excess of \$10,000,000 had been pledged.

Archbishop Garnsworthy highly praised Archdeacon McKean for his outstanding contribution. His Grace stated that A. I. M. exceeded our wildest dream. The sum of \$10,000,000 was pledged in our Diocese when \$8,000,000 seemed an impossible goal. The money will be spent for ministry, for evangelism, for communications, for church development, and for projects wherever needed.

Archdeacon McKean attributed the great success of A. I. M. to positive and active support by the bishops, to fine leadership. excellent professional gouncel.

To date there has been sanety-three per cent. parish participation. Eventually this will be higher. Have you, as a committed Anglican, shared in this exhilarating achievement?

Concerning finances, it was moved that the 1984 Budget for Assessment of \$1,829,090, and Outreach of \$1,368,090 be approved. The motion was carried.

A gratifying change in the Constitution related to voting privileges of members. Previously no lay member was allowed to vote on motions presented to Synod if the congregation represented by the delegate had failed to pay the amounts fallen due for assessment, outreach, stipend, pension, or benefits.

It was felt that the only persons being penalized under the process were the lay members who, of themselves, exert the least influence over the clergy and wardens who are charged with the leadership role in the parish.

The change in the Constitution removed the embarrassment of denied voting rights because of unpaid assessments. There was a feeling in the Synod of trying to help struggling parishes.

Following the report on Doctrine and Worship, considerable discussion ensued regarding the Alternate Service Book which will be completed hopefully within a year. The book is intended, not as a replacement, but as a supplement, to the Book of Common Prayer. Bishop Parke-Taylor assured members that the Book of Common Prayer still remains our official prayer book.

From the lively speeches delivered during the Members' Hour, and from information contained in distributed leaflets, one gathered that our church is very much alive to such current problems as unemployment, poverty, matrimonial problems, open Sunday, racial discrimination, and disarmament.

During the closing session, Synod declared a "Year of Evangelism" for the Diocese of Toronto, on the recommendation of the Diocesan Committee on Renewal and Evangelism. The year will wan from September 1, 1984, to June 30, 1985. Activities will be planned to emphasize the theme of Evangelism.

The 131st Bynod of the Diocese of Toronto ended on a positive note. Achievements in the past have been great. Now, with vision, let us meet the challenge of the future.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Fifty-four individuals and families returned pledge cards for the year 1984. This is down 6 from last year. The fifty-four who returned pledge cards estimate their total givings for the year 1984 to be \$26,600.00 which represents a decrease of \$473.00 from the \$27,073.00 which was the estimated amount of givings of the 60 individuals and families who returned pledge cards for the year 1983.

In order to arrive at estimated givings for 1984 of those who do not pledge but who do contribute to the Church, we have used the amount of their past year's givings as a guide. However, those who have not given during the past two quarterly periods or those known to have transferred from the parish have not been included.

Also, some parishioners are known to have given in excess of their pledges but no estimate of such givings has been included.

The total estimate of all givings for 1984 (including pledges and others estimated as above) from a total of 99 individuals and families, is \$38,000.00. This is a slight increase over the past year's estimate of \$36,569.00 from 93 individuals and families.

Elsewhere in this Parish Report, in a statement prepared by our Treasurer, it is recorded that the givings of our subscribers (which of course, includes those who pledged as well as those whose contributions were estimated) exceeded our expectations of a year ago by approximately \$5,000.00, which indicates to us that our method of estimation of probable givings may be conservative.

A comparative table showing numbers of pledgers and additional givers for the year 1984 as against the year 1983, broken down on an anticipated "weekly givings" basis, is as follows:

As you will have noted, the above information has been compiled from a combination of our parishioners' stated intentions plus estimates of other probable intentions and/or actions and is therefore, to a considerable extent, only a "best guess". It is hoped that such intentions and estimates will not only be met but greatly exceeded in view of our projected deficit for 1984 (see Budget elsewhere in this Parish Report).

THEOLOGICAL BURSARY FUND

In November 1976, through donations from former Bible Class members and many parishioners, the establishing of the Theological Bursary Fund took place, along with the unveiling anddedication of the Bible Classes' Window and Memorial Board (in the Narthex).

Present for the ceremonies were the late Right Reverend H.R. Hunt, the then Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, the Hon. Pauline McGibbon, and the late Reverend Canon Minto Swan.

Since that time, some ten students have received assistance and an annual donation has been given to Wycliffe College. As you will see in the Financial statement, the fund now stands at \$5,595.79, together with available interest in the amount of \$894.29.

The morning also was the occasion for the first performance of a new twelve-tone serial anthem The Ark by the Organist. Again, Feather, Quita, Dandy and Danielle were soloists.

Special music was performed for the official inaugaration of Mr. King's ministry with us in the fall. Christmas Fve was marked by our second performance of Lubeck's Christmas Cantata. Also in the fall, we were able to welcome the Wichelows back to the choir, and Kim and Tammy Hoyland are welcome new additions.

The choir had an enjoyable social season with a picnic in June and the annual choir party in December. The officers of 1983 were re-elected for 1984: John Gower, President; May Webster, Vice-President and Librarian; Marilyn Shortt, Secretary-Treasurer.
