

#### RECTOR'S REPORT.

Life has been lived deeply at St. John's this past year. It has been a time of preparation and transition, of laughter and tears, of giving and receiving. It has been a year of coming together and of going out to perform our separate ministries as servants of the faithful God, who out of the mystery of the divine love, creates and redeems this world. "Taste and see, taste and see, that the Lord is good, the Lord is good."

As it turns out, much of 1988 has been a year of preparation; preparing for the year to come. At this time last year, Vestry passed two motions: one to work to make possible the opening and operation of a day care centre; and second, to make the church's building accessible to people who, at present, can only enter with great physical difficulty. The Wardens and many parishioners have worked long and hard this past hear to translate Vestry's motions of good intentions into reality. 1989 will be a year of realization as these projects move from paper to bricks and mortar. In a few months St. John's will be opened daily, caring for fifty-four children and proclaiming to our community that we care.

In response to the democratic and episcopal heritage that is ours as Anglicans, we have entered into a covenant relationship with parishes throughout the diocese to raise money for ministry through Faith in Action. Supported and encouraged by our newly installed diocesan bishop, the Right Reverend Terence Finlay, we will need to raise through pledges, \$55,500.00 over the next five years.

This amount sounds onerous, but spread across the parish, it's not so bad. Very few people in our parish family cannot afford to pledge an extra \$2 to \$4 more each week. That is what a \$500 to \$1,000 pledge would entail.

On behalf of all of us, I would like to give our sincere thanks to Anthony Ruta, Garnet Devitt and Allan Waters for taking on the task of overseeing our response to Faith in Action. Everyone knows how difficult it is to ask for money. Let's be supportive, grateful and generous. It is a small way to make a big statement: I AM PROUD TO BE AN ANGLICAN.

Nothing makes Christian worship the symbol of hope and good news that it is than when it is done in and through the fullness of the human family. When men and women and children come together to offer that which is appropriate to each as "a reasonable, holy and living sacrifice" acceptable to and precious in the eyes of the Lord.

In this context, I want to impart the good news that we are growing; growing deeper in the Lord and in the humanity God so graciously took onto Himself in Jesus and which he continues to take into Himself through the Church. Let us remember always that the more we authenticate ourselves as a parish community, earnestly and hopefully seeking to hear his Word and to give that Word to others through acts of caring and reconciliation, the more truthfully we can say, we are growing.

In this context, also, I would like to report on the motion coming up before this Vestry of 1989. This motion, involving the creation of a trust to allow St. John's to be an umbrella group for families in our parish with special needs children, has been researched by our Deputy Warden, Sheila Crummey. It allows us to reach out, by reaching in. To give a word of hope to the thousands of families in Ontario with similar needs by reaching inward to stand by and befriend people within our own congregation.

One of the great blessings of this past year, beginning with the now "infamous" pancake supper on Shrove Tuesday, has been the entrance into our parish family of the Helleiner's, David Holmes, the Mamura's and the Mohler's. In addition to being a well of commitment, faith and talent from whose waters we have all had the pleasure of refreshment, each of these families (David is somewhere and everywhere in the midst of this) have children - Peter, Timmy, Colin, Craig and Chelsea - who have special needs. These needs place additional demands to the already demanding role of being a parent. They have, in addition to the normal and always special care required of parents the task (and the anxiety) of working actively to insure an environment, continuing through adulthood, that is conducive to human growth and potential. As a parish we can help them and the reasons that we should help, are self-evident. We are a Christian Community and Christians are known by the love they bear for one another. Please, read and make the matter of this motion the substance of your prayer.

I began last year's report by saying that "there is no parish in Christendom that I would trade for St. John's". This year I will end with that.

Go bless each of you. By opening yourself to his love and mercy, you have allowed God to be worshipped, praised and adored in this place. Let's move forward into this next year at St. John's.

# DAYCARE COMMITTEE

The Daycare Committee had a very busy year in 1988. We have been meeting regularly all year and have made significant progress toward our goal of opening a daycare centre at St. John's.

Architectural plans are ready and are currently being put out for tender. Funding has been received from government and church sources. When the final bid packages are submitted the decision to go forward will be made. Extra funding may be required, and is being sought. At the moment however, our cost estimates appear to be close enough to budget to allow us to proceed.

Thanks are due Father Robert, Brother William, The Wardens and the whole Daycare Committee for their devoted service during the year. St John's is lucky to have such a dedicated group with such a wide range of practical skills. Finally, thanks are due you, the people of St. John's. Your interest and support have carried us to the threshold of attaining our goal.

#### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The Church School continues to be a vital part of the life at St. John's. The basic programme for Sundays remains the same as last year, with classes offered for Nursery. Pre-School, Kindergarten, Primary and Intermediate grade levels. The curriculum used is <u>Living the Good News</u>, a lectionary based curriculum, published by the Episcopal Diocese of Colorado. We continue to find this curriculum very satisfactory, particularly in the theological preparation materials provided for the teachers

Participation of the children in the liturgy is an essential part of the programme. Many of the children, in first grade and above, regularly act as servers. One Sunday a month, designated as 'family Sunday', the children are in church for the full service, and participate in as many ways as possible, i.e. reading the lessons, carrying the offering, and serving. On other Sundays, the children begin the service in the church, where a children's focus opens the service. After the focus, which is usually pased on the gospel for the day, the children go down stairs to their classes. They return at the Offertory for the remainder of the service.

During the year, the children have been incorporated in special services including baptisms, the parish Thanksgiving service, the parish anniversary celebration, and lighting of the Advent wreath.

In order to compliment this involvement in the liturgy, an additional class has been started for the children, eight years and older, which concentrates on the Scripture and the Seasons of the church year. This class meets for one hour, on the third Sunday of each month, during the Adult forum hour. This is the first effort to supplement the Good News curriculum with a 'series' offering. As the opportunity arises, additional series will be offered.

Family events are also an important part of the education programme. The Spring Picnic and Family Halloween Party are a part of this activity. New this year, an Advent Wreath Workshop held concurrently to the ACW's annual Holly tea was a great success, with thirty advent wreaths being made, and then plessed and lighted at the service on the First Sunday of Advent, before being taken home for family use.

The Christmas Party and Pageant involved a musical production of "Moses . In which over twenty-five children participated. Thanks to the hard work of the children, the parents, and the Church School musicians, Pauline and Rich Payne, it was a big success.

Worshipping, learning, working and playing together are viewed as equally important pieces of being members of God's family. We attempt to create an atmosphere where each child is made to feel important, and where individual gifts can be encouraged. All children are encouraged to participate, even those with special needs.

Many of the parents are involved as Church school teachers, and take an active part in the family activities. There are generally between 20-30 children in Church school each Sunday, and ten adults who teach, some each Sunday and others on a rotating basis. The teachers are Linda Craine, Sheila Crummey, Kathy Gower, Lindell Mitchell, Anne Ruta, Dean Samaras, Laura Samaras, Cynthia Stoddart-Webster, Mabel-Anne Waters, Carolyn kerr has served as Nursery Coordinator. In addition to Pauline and Rich Payne, Sandra Nemenyi and Jennifer LaMarche have contributed to the children's music programme.

Since beginning as Christian Education Director in September, I have been very favorably impressed with the commitment to children's programmes and their involvement in the total life of the parish.

#### Care-Ring West Toronto

With the help of St John's and other participating churches in the West End Care-Ring West Toronto has been able to continue it's neighbourly service throughout 1988.

A third member of our congregation, Joyce Sauer, has become a regular telephone volunteer and Madge Irvine has helped as much as her delicate health will allow. We all pray that her present so journ in Florida will restore her strength.

Recruitment of volunteers has not been easy in the past year. The development of support services under government grants, but still depending largely upon volunteers, and the extension of Wheel-Trans programmes has made us take a good look at our role in the community. It is in nobody's interest for these services to be in competition against one-another, rather the relationship should be complementary.

As your representative on the Board of C-R W.T., I would remind you that from the beginning we have been affiliated to Care-Ring Canada and thus are bound by the terms of a formal constitution. Clause No 5 of that document reads thus:-

"The services of a group will be financed by voluntary contributions from churches, service organizations or other sources, but no funds will be accepted by a group from any government body."

All other clauses in the constitution emphasize the voluntary and non profit making nature of the organization, with the exception of an honorarium which may be paid to a part time or full-time co-ordinator. In our case this has been no more than payment for expenses incurred.

We have been lucky enough to find a volunteer to meet this need up to now, but in some other parts of Toronto where the volume of service has, perhaps, been greater several groups are finding it necessary to request a change in the rules in order to allow them to apply for municipal funding.

The C-R. W.T. Executive felt that such a change might not be acceptable to their membership because it is in conflict with the founding philosophy of voluntary service. However since we all function independently within the terms of the constitution the proposed change, which seems to be essential to the survival of some groups, need not affect us at all unless we choose to take advantage of it.

From the point of view of operation we anticipate very little change in utilization figures over those for 1987 when this years statistics are in. We have 100 regular clients, some dating from our very early days and whom we have helped to re-main independent, we have helped, spiritually and practically to keep them in their own homes.

#### THEOLOGICAL BURSARY FUND AND MEMORIAL BOARD

Through donations from former Bible Class members and many Parishioners, the establishing of the Theological Bursary Fund took place, along with the unveiling and dedication of the Bible Classes' Memorial Window and Plaque and the Memorial Board given in memory of Frank E. Munroe: all of which may be seen in the Narthex.

Present for the ceremonies in November 1976, were the Rev. Canon M.P.Poole, the late Right Rev. H.R.Hunt, the Honourable Pauline McGibbon, (the then Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario), the late Rev. Canon Minto Swan, founder of the Alert Men's Bible Class, the Rev. Derwyn Shea and Captain Ray Taylor of the Church Army.

At that time, along with the many donations, a sizeable amount was received from a group of Retired Clergy and Clergy Wives, living in Victoria, B.C. Also, a former class-member - now living in the U.S.A. - continued to send a yearly donation to the Fund.

Through accrued interest on the fund of \$6,170.74, some 18 students have received financial assistance, and donations have been given for students' funds of Wycliffe and Trinity Colleges and the Church Army.

During 1987, legacies were gratefully received from the estates of Audrie Rose, Ruth Shortt and Laura Renwick. In the Fall, a plaque was placed on the Memorial Board, dedicated to the Glory of God and in loving memory of Ruth Shortt. Also, in her memory, a Sanctuary Lamp was dedicated, being given by members of the Shortt family.

In 1988, a funeral Pall was donated to the Church in memory of Ella Ambersley, given by her son Glenn.
