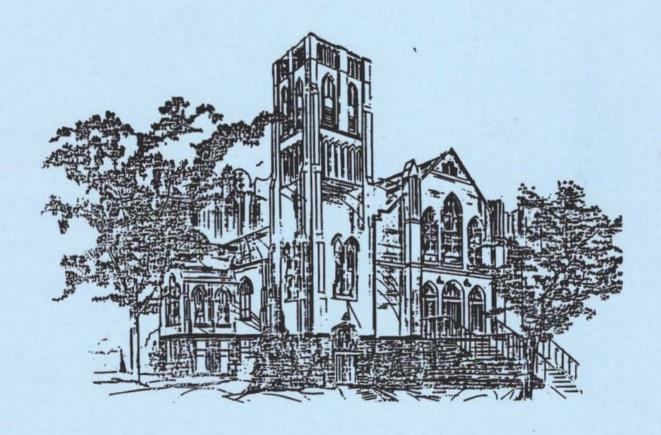

RECTOR'S REPORT

I will begin this year's report with referring back to our two previous vestries, 1988 and 1989, as much of our activities have been working to implement and carry out four resolutions from these parish meetings. The substance of these resolutions is as follows:

- To renovate the Parish Hall for the operation of a day care centre.
- To renovate the bell tower to make the church's buildings accessible.
- To covenant with other parishes in the diocese to take part in Faith in Action.
- To establish a Trust Fund to support and network with families with members who have special needs.

In each instance the members of the parish have responded faithfully. The parish hall is renovated and the day care in operation, the bell tower is nearing completion, we have raised over \$52,000.00 for Faith in Action, and the Trust Fund is coming together in an exciting, if sometimes inchoate, way. On your behalf, I would like to thank those who participated in and who are still working to bring these activities to fruition. For many hours of hard work, I would like to thank the Wardens and Deputy Wardens, the Finance Committee, the members of the Day Care steering committee, the parishoners on the Day Care Board, the members of the Trust fund steering committee and the members of the Faith in Action team.

While we may justifiably proud of our accomplishments, for they have been meritorious, our continuing support and participation are still needed.

One phenomenon which we knew would happen, but in our planning failed to full appreciate the significance of, is the greatly increased time our building's space is used. Monday to Friday the lights go on at 6:30 a.m. and day care begins, at 9:00 a.m. Lynda arrives and the Church office is opened, at 6:00 p.m. the day care closes and parish programming begins. Cubs, Beavers, Sparks, Guides, Brownies, Pathfinders and Rangers have the evenings Monday to Thursday. Wednesday nights the choir arrives. Friday and Sunday evenings our High Park AA arrives. Did you know that over 120 people are in your parish hall every Friday and Sunday evening helping one another fight the addiction of alcoholism? (Ponder the implication of this to our neighbourhood!) With these regular week by week activities go our Logos Programmes, Lenten programmes, Day Care and Trust Fund Board meetings, support groups, Bible studies, etc., etc.

With this increase of activity has come great rewards. We have been challenged to work together and to think of one another. It has been a wonderful sight to behold, and on Vestry's behalf, I thank all those people and groups who have cooperated so very well together.

With this said I would like to move on in a more general and reflective way. This is the first Vestry of a new decade. For our parish community the 1980's have been a whirlwind experience, and in many ways continues to be so. One theme and one word seems to be in one way or another a part of all that has happened. That word is INCLUSION.

"Go, then, to all people everywhere and make them my disciples: baptize them in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, and teach them to obey everything I have commanded you. And I will be with you always, to the end of the age."

All nations, all ages, all genders, all states of life are to be included and their gifts recognized in the communal, diaconal, kerygmatic and liturgical life of the church. This decade and the two preceding it have brought about a reformation of such magnitude that the proclamation of the Gospel and how it is lived out in our lives will never again be the same. Finally, after centuries of subtle and not so subtle, of intentional and of totally unintentional, efforts being made on who's in and who's out, both the media and the message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ is being restored. In Christ there is no Jew or Greek, no male or female, no slave or free. All the baptized stand and share at the Lord's Table, the Word is conveyed to all in ways appropriate to each, and the community is enriched in the fullness of the humanity it is and which it represents to the world.

Lord help us in this awesome task! Let you Holy Spirit, that bond of love and truth that binds us together as your people, keep us honest, open, and ever vigilant to receive and to rejoice in our differences that we may be so transformed by your grace that your will may be done on earth as it is in heaven.

This spring the liturgy committee has taken on itself the task of planning an all parish conference. It is my hope this conference will provide us with an opportunity to discuss openly the evangelical challenge presented to us around the issues of inclusion. Because it requires honesty and love, truth and equity; the questions will be both hard and wonderful, covering an array of topics reflective of our community components - children, families, singles, couples, male and female, racial and national origin, the poor, middle-aged and seniors, people with special needs - shut-ins, etc.

We do it well. How can we do it better? Who's being left out? Who's being left behind? Who's ahead? How can we catch up? Slow down?

As your pastor, I think its time that we be prayerful, reflective and intentional in this area. In my experience honesty is both the beginning and the end of prayer, as Jesus is both the way and the truth. Let's begin this decade intent on building a community worthy of that life, given and received, that the source of our life might be that light which no darkness can overcome.

Again, there is no parish in Christendom I would exchange for you.

WE ARE THE PEOPLE OF GOD

The word has been proclaimed in Scripture, Preaching and Sacrament on the Lord's Day, each Sunday over the past year. Our average weekly attendance is 108; 102 at the 10:30 Eucharist and 6 at the 8:30. Our attendance on Holy days and special occasions is as follows:

WARDEN'S REPORT

We wish to present a short review of 1989, as it was at St. John's. It has been a year of visible changes, not the least of which is the increase from Sunday to Sunday of new parishioners, including families. We welcome you all and we especially are pleased to include our "special" young people.

This year marks the creation of a Trust 'West-end Special Needs Support Group' set up to assist with the management of costs involved for the care of this special group of children.

The biggest visible change is, of course, our new Day Care facility which opened September 1st. We thank you for your patience during the tremendous disruption as we renovated. We are told that our facility is one of the finest in Metro. It is a non-profit endeavour but St. John's benefits financially by shared cost of heating, utilities, caretaking and office staff. Your wardens have been closely involved in the process of creating the Day Care.

Because of the construction there was a lack of space for various meetings. We wish to thank the Priory for their hospitality in hosting many of the meetings and special events, so frequently and generously.

Also, we wish to thank our excellent staff - both those who retired during the year - John Bateman in the office and Brother Orlando, Sexton; and Lynda Woolrich (Administrative Assistant) and Wally Barrett (custodian), the new faces, working also for Day Care.

Special events this year included: a Faith-in-Action dinner at which Irene Munroe and Gladys Graham were honoured in recognition of their many years of tireless work for St. John's - a day-long pastoral visit with Bishop Finlay in May which concluded with a buffet supper (at the Priory) and a service - the traditional B.B.Q. in September - Halloween party - the special service at The Dome which many attended - the Holly Tea and children's advent-wreath making in December - all these church-family activities were stellar events! Christmas festivities were climaxed with the exceptional special services.

The Faith in Action response has been excellent. The direct benefit to the parish is that 50% of the funds (less administration costs) is returned to us for designated purposes. We agreed at Vestry to apply this rebate to the access-elevator project. We are all delighted with this wonderful new facility in the Tower entrance.

We continue to move forward with Father Robert at the helm, assisted so well by Brother William -a good team!

A good record, St. John's!

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The Christian Education Committee has ventured into some new areas this past year. A decision was made to take a "sabbatical year" from Living the Good News, the curriculum which had been used for the past number of years, in order to focus on some particular topical areas. The programme is modelled to some degree on the "open school" approach, in that all the children would be in a single ungraded group, breaking up into age groups only when a particular activity warrants it. The content is largely experiential. This format also provided the opportunity for us to experiment with monthly teaching teams and giving the teachers longer periods between teaching assignments.

The curriculum was designed as a series of month long units, the first two on Baptism and Holy Eucharist respectively, followed by a series of units called "The Story of God's People," which covers significant events and people in the Old Testament, the New Testament and in Church history, with a Lenten unit on the life of Jesus.

The children's focus which takes place at the beginning of the service generally covers one aspect of the topic for the day that may also be instructive for the whole congregation. For example, one focus during the Baptism unit was on water, and one during the Eucharist unit featured Jewish table blessings.

Services of instructed Baptism and instructed Holy Eucharist for the whole congregation took place at the end of each unit. These services were well received. The November-December unit was on Creation and ended with the annual Christmas musical/pageant called "In the Beginning...From The Creation of the World to Noah," which was also a great success, with over twenty children participating.

For the most part this curriculum plan has been working well, after some initial adjustments to our wonderful new space in with all the temptations available from the Day Care materials. Plans are underway to add a class for the toddler set, as they are too young to participate in the other programme, yet need more than a nursery. Recruiting new teachers is always an on-going challenge.

We continue to have approximately 20 to 30 children present each Sunday. The teachers are Evelyn Butler, Linda Craine, Sheila Crummey, Jim Lever, Mara Nickerson, Adrienne Roffey, Anne Ruta, Dean Samaras, Laura Samaras, Gary van der Meer, Cynthia Stoddart-Webster, Mabel-Anne Waters. Jennifer and Bridget LaMarche and Fred Addis have provided us with music. Marion Barker has efficiently handled the scheduling of people for the nursery.

Because of the wonderful way that children are included in all aspects of the liturgical life of the parish at St. John's, we continue to struggle with finding the best mix between their participation in the service and periods of other types of instruction. But I feel that the very fact that we have this ongoing struggle is a sign of both the success of the mission of the parish to be an inclusive one, and of the vitality of the Christian Education Committee, and the parish as a whole.

LAY READERS

The number of lay readers now stands at over 30, many of whom are also choristers or Sunday School teachers (which goes to prove that one can do both!)

Again this fall, a workshop on reading techniques took place, with Brother William giving us the benefit of his expertise, and some amusing-and helpful-printed matter supplied by John Gower.

Another highlight of the year was the reading of Advent lessons, organised by the Liturgy Committee, with the Old Testament lessons proclaimed from the balcony, and at least one very dramatic Gospel reading, in a form close to "chancel drama".

Lay readers serve as lectors (readers of lessons) and intercessors (readers of prayers). They read once every month or two-a service both rewarding and far from onerous. If you wish to consider serving in this way, please contact the Church Office, or see me after church.

WEST TORONTO CARE RING

Thank you for your continuing interest and support over the last 12 months.

As you may know from the local press and from your board members, Care Ring is in a crisis situation. The crisis is not financial since your generosity and that of grateful clients provides sufficient funds to cover our operational expenses. All Care Ring personnel are volunteers. We have no paid staff.

The problems which face us now are fivefold.

Firstly, we have not been able to attract a co-ordiantor, in spite of repeated advertising. Secondly, we have been unable to man the phones on a regular basis, and the tape machine has not entirely filled the gaps. Many of our clients are elderly and are rather puzzled by the equipment. Thirdly, we have been unable to fill the executive slate for 1990. We have a treasurer but no chairperson, no past chairperson, no secretary and no publicity officer. The latter deficiency compounds the fifth problem, which is that of recruiting new volunteers.

The letters of appeal to our membership together with the "spread" in the Villager are the work of the Crisis Committee which was set up to ensure that should Care Ring West Toronto be forced to close down, the private driving, visiting, etc. would continue to be available and that there would be no hardship to our clients, many of whom are very long-term.

At time of writing we have every hope that a satisfactory solution will be found. Should the service of Care Ring West Toronto be discontinued, any remaining funds will be distributed to other Care Ring Canada facilities according to the policy laid down in our Constitution.

We would like to take this opportunity to wish you every prosperity in 1990.

THEOLOGICAL BURSARY FUND AND MEMORIAL BOARD

To provide information for the many new members of St. John's congregation and because, when the Fund was initiated, one of the stipulations was that a yearly report would be made to our Vestry, I repeat the following historical facts.

Through donations from former Bible Class members, parishioners and friends, the unveiling and dedication of the Bible Classes' window and wall plaque took place. At the time the Memorial Board was dedicated in memory of Mr. Frank E. Munroe; all of which may be seen in the Narthex.

Present for the ceremonies in November 1976 were the Reverend Canon M.P. Poole, the late Right Rev. H.R. Hunt, the Honourable Pauline McGibbon (the then Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario), the late Reverend Canon Minto Swan - founder of the Alert Men's Bible Class, the Reverend Derwyn Shea and Captain Ray Taylor of the Church Army in Canada.

The funds remaining from the cost of the above mentioned window were the basis of the ongoing Theological Bursary Fund. A group of "Retired Clergy and Clergy Wives" living in Victoria, B.C. also participated in this venture.

Dispensing the accrued interest on this fund of \$6,160.74, some 19 students have received financial assistance in their theological studies and in 1989 the usual donations were sent to the "Students Fund" of each of the Colleges - Trinity and Wycliffe, and to the Church Army.
